

CROSS RIVER PARTNERSHIP LAUNCHES CLEAN AIR VILLAGES RIVER FREIGHT PILOT ALONG THE THAMES

<u>Cross River Partnership</u> (CRP), a non-profit and impartial partnership organisation, is excited to launch a river freight pilot along the River Thames as part of the Defra-funded <u>Clean Air</u> <u>Villages 4</u> project on Tuesday 26th July.

CRP is working with the Port of London Authority, The Northbank BID, GPS Marine, Complete, iRecycle, Mayflower, Antalis and London's pier owners.

In a new era of opportunity for the river, bringing goods into central London via the Thames is proven to emit less than half of the carbon of road transport, improving local air quality. With deliveries into the capital set to hit one billion per year by 2030, spurred on by changing shopping habits, river freight has the potential to reduce both congestion and pollution in London. The pilot aims to assess how goods delivered by the river and handled at Woods Quay (out of trading hours), located at Embankment, can be incorporated within urban logistics.

Businesses in The Northbank BID and surrounding areas are being invited to order office and cleaning suppliers from participating suppliers during a six-week pilot period. Goods will travel down the Thames from Dartford and Woolwich, arriving into Woods Quay, located on Embankment, next to Waterloo Bridge. Through this pilot, businesses and suppliers will work together to consolidate deliveries, helping London's economy and freight industry.

The pilot is also aiming to collect general waste, which will be taken to Walbrook Wharf and be taken along the river to Belvedere for disposal.

The last-mile journey for these goods will be undertaken by zero-emission transport, from London's piers onto the roads of central London. The river freight industry is also exploring alternative fuels for vessels.

CRP Project Manager Kate Fenton said "The Thames provides a direct route into London and therefore an alternative to using our congested and polluted roads. The Defra Air Quality Grant has enabled this exciting collaboration and the opportunity to showcase river freight to businesses. Understanding and sharing how to setup such operations will help other businesses navigate river freight more easily. An increase in use of the river for freight will improve local air quality in London. Huge thanks to all those working hard to get these goods onto the water."

James Trimmer, Director of Planning and Development at the Port of London Authority, said "London businesses' office supplies, such as stationery, are far better transported by river than ending up stationary on the capital's congested roads. This pilot is set to further unlock the tidal Thames's huge potential to improve air quality, by reducing road traffic in London,




and help on the river's journey towards Net Zero. It's another win-win for the Thames, London and the environment.

Clean Air Villages 4
